REPORT ON WORK DONE BY CALCUTTA RESEARCH GROUP (CRG) ON THE SOUTH ASIA NETWORK FOR COMMUNICATION, DISPLACEMENT AND MIGRATION (SAN-CDM) August – December 2022

Introduction:

Following the <u>South Asia Consultations: Media, Information and Participation in Displacement and</u> <u>Migration Setting</u>, the Calcutta Research Group, henceforth CRG (<u>www.mcrg.ac.in</u>) put together the <u>South Asia Network for Communication, Displacement and Migration (SAN-CDM)</u> in collaboration with DW Akademie.

Vision and Mission Statement of the SAN-CDM:

CRG and DW Akademie arrived at the need for a regional network of journalists and other stakeholders in South Asia, in contexts of displacement and migration, from complementary yet separate trajectories. In the course of the South Asia consultations, the need to develop a "A network of regional actors comprising journalists, media houses, media schools, advocacy groups, rights activists, research organizations, labor unions, civil society groups etc." was strongly felt by all participants. The SAN-CDM has been formed to enhance cross-border and intraregional collaboration between journalists, academics, community members and civil society actors, through exchange of knowledge, expertise and ideas.

Hosted by the CRG, the SAN-CDM aims to provide support to regional actors in improving media coverage, access to information, and participation of refugees and migrants in media making. Through its dedicated website, network of stakeholders and newsletters, the SAN-CDM will promote inclusive media making practices in the region, contribute to the media discourse on migrants and refugees, and facilitate exchange of ideas and opportunities among its members and interested participants.

The following report is a short summary of CRG activities related to the SAN-CDM in the period August- December 2022.

1. The network website:

- Contacting network members, creating database: The Programme Officer, under the guidance of the Programme Supervisor and the Technical Advisor contacted all the participants of the South Asia consultations, as well as past participants of CRG media programmes. - 3. Content for the network website:

- 4. Creating and Maintaining Database: Network members are periodically requested to inform the Programme Officer about their achievements, publications, etc. However, very few of them have responded. Those of the network members who reached out to the Programme officer, have had their information included in the newsletter. The members' list has an updated database of the members.

- 6. The Programme Supervisor and the Programme officer discussed separately with some network members about the feasibility of creating a voluntary steering group. While the members agreed in principle, it was felt that a separate meeting, ideally in person, during the proposed February conference, would make the steering group a reality. CRG also discussed with Bharat Bhushan, who has been the most regular and enthusiastic participant in network activities, the possibility of taking up the position of the network coordinator. This conversation is ongoing.
- The SAN-CDM was launched formally with an inaugural online event on <u>27 October</u> <u>2022</u>, Thursday, at 6:30 PM IST on "Climate Disaster, Migration, and New reporting: A South <u>Asian Discussion"</u>. 88 people from across South Asia and Europe joined the meeting. Programme Schedule:

9. Third online event: CRG in DW Akademie hosted <u>the third online event on Refugees and</u> <u>Forced Migrants (South Asian Perspective) on 27.12.2022, at 1:30-3:00 pm IST</u>. It was a need assessment meeting, conducted by Zobaer Ahmed, a Multimedia Journalist from Bangladesh working on the area of migration and refugees.

This needs analysis meeting was conducted to understand the needs and challenges academics face in disseminating the knowledge developed by them in their research on migration and displacement settings. One of the concerns voiced by many journalists in the South Asia Consultations was their lack of access to academic knowledge and data, which hindered their ability to present holistic and region-wide stories. Academics were also put to task for writing incomprehensibly. Simultaneously, journalists felt the need for more humanitarian and story-driven reportage. This needs analysis meeting highlighted some of the more pressing needs in this context.

Zobaer Ahmed focused on displacement as the main point of discussion and asked the participants about their respective needs from the training programme. The participants raised some important questions, such as how to disseminate the research or journalistic work but also how to make the voices of the migrants themselves understood or what impact our words have on the audience? The question of the implications of images that have deep imprints on the minds of people, ameliorating the stereotypes more and more, also came up. Another question was how can we go beyond stereotypes and cliched narratives about displacement and migration. These narratives are usually about people who are either victimised or criminalised. How can we come out of that and build real perspectives and other perspectives as well? How to breach the difference between us and them?

Also, casual references about the total number of refugees or forced migrants do not make us understand the people or the situation they are living in. Another point was that in mainstream media practices, people engaged with media needs to be sensitive about using sensitive words and sensitive images, as they can cause a lot of misrepresentation and misconception.

Another crucial point raised by the participants was that as researchers and journalists working in the field of migration and displacement, we should not be the 'trojan horse' either, and include people from the marginalised groups which are suffering. The training programme ended with the discussion about the impact and utilisation of data in news-making or storytelling. How can we make people imagine/visualise what we are writing? How to mitigate bias/ empathy/ sympathy in journalistic writing? Do we have multiple ways of getting our point across? These were some of the queries that rightfully pointed towards the scope of another such training programme and possible ways of new collaborations in such a way that would help us remove biases and extraneous variables while writing about the displaced.

10. CRG announced the <u>first conference/workshop of SAN-CDM</u>, in collaboration with DW Akademie <u>on "Forced Migration and Media in South Asia"</u> from 4-7 February 2023 in Nepal. Interested media persons, civil society representatives, and researchers from different universities and media schools were requested to apply to this programme. CFA was sent to the stakeholders of the South Asian Consultations, the members of CRG and the network members, as well as widely disseminated on SAN-CDM and CRG's media handles. More than 60 persons applied to be part of the conference. After two rounds of discussions with DW Akademie colleagues and an external evaluator, a shortlist has been prepared, which has been shared with DW Akademie colleagues.
